Prepositions Dice Game

Explanation

Prepositional phrases allow us to be precise about time, direction and place (or position). A prepositional phrase is usually made up of a preposition (under) followed by a noun phrase or pronoun (under the table). If we add prepositional phrases to our sentences, the reader has more information about the time or position of the event being described.

The car skidded.

The car skidded across the slippery surface.

Note: when prepositional phrases are used at the start of the sentence, they can function as fronted adverbials. Across the slippery surface, the car skidded.

Players: 2

You will need: a 1-6 dice, a dice guide for each pair, paper and pens

1. First, player A rolls the dice to pick a main clause (e.g. the creature crawled)

2. Then player A rolls again to pick the type of prepositional phrase that they must add to the main clause. (If player A rolls a 4, they must add a 'direction' prepositional phrase e.g. Towards the grey mountain, the creature crawled.)

3. Now it is the turn of player B to carry out steps 1 and 2.

4. Keep playing until both players are confident at adding prepositional phrases to main clauses.

Challenge yourself! Use the Challenge version so that players will have to add more adventurous prepositional phrases to different positions in the sentence. Can they add more than one prepositional phrase?

Support (If this is new to you or you would like some practise) ! Use the Support version so that players only have to think about 'when?' and 'where?' using a more limited choice of prepositions to create phrases.

EVEN (2,4,6)	Where?	above, at, behind, below, near, beside, between, next to, on, under, in, outside, inside, over Examples: He hid under the bed. He relaxed on the sofa.
